- A little more detail:** Think “health care” but also think “health.” We want a variety of examples. The more creative the better. Good health initiatives (walking trails; a community “boot” camp, etc.) are one kind of initiative. Improved delivery of high-end health care might be another (in a county with inadequate ratios of primary care doctors, a creative solution to connecting to primary care might be a model initiative). Your example might be hospital-based; it might be school-based; it might be faith-based; it might be the product of one creative individual’s hard work. There’s no one answer to what’s a good model. In fact, the more citizen initiative these examples celebrate, the better.



In examining the examples collected from around the state, the Friedell Committee will be guided by this grid of “keys” to an ideal example.

The Friedell Committee's Ten Core Principles

1. Health systems are ***accountable to the public*** in every aspect of care and resource use.
2. Health systems are responsible for ***promoting the health of individuals and populations*** throughout the entire life span.
3. Health professionals and systems are responsible for providing ***safe and effective care***.
4. Each individual has ***equal access to effective care*** without regard to race, gender, culture, geography or socioeconomic status.
5. Care for each individual is ***safe and of high quality***.
6. Care for each individual is ***affordable***.
7. Care for each individual is ***efficient and of high value*** to recipient and family.
8. Patients and families are ***treated with respect***.
9. ***Patient rights*** are clearly expressed and honored.
10. Individuals and communities ***share responsibility*** for their health and for the cost of care.
